This year, we opened our doors in Pleasantville, NY. The new climate controlled archive provides increased access to our collections and a work space for on-site researchers, students, curators and scholars. Our dedicated staff continues to help bring Gordon Parks' artistic work and his important story to the public.

We also worked closely with the High Museum in Atlanta and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston on two focused exhibitions on Parks' work in the segregated south and his return to his roots in Fort Scott, Kansas. Both exhibitions have accompanying catalogues published by Steidl and we are pleased that more exhibitions and publications are planned.

"Twenty-four years before I had walked proudly to the center of the stage and received a diploma. There were twelve of us (six girls and six boys) that night. Our emotions were intermingled with sadness and gaiety. None of us understood why the first years of our education were separated from those of the white; nor did we bother to ask. The situation existed before we were born. We waded in normally at the tender age of six and swam out maladjusted and complexed nine years later...My classmates from Plaza had drifted as if with the winds. The reports were varied concerning each; so varied that I decided to chart their course and find where they had dropped anchor."

Gordon Parks, from the draft for the unpublished *Life* story "Back to Fort Scott," 1950

In the spring of 1950 Gordon Parks was asked by his editors at *Life* to do a feature story on the topic of segregated schools, a corrosive issue that had become the subject of national debate, especially in his home state of Kansas. With this assignment he tackled the issue as seen through the lens of his own childhood and set out to track down the entire class of 1927 from the all-black Plaza School in Fort Scott. Having been away for more than two decades, Parks returned to the small town in the southeastern corner of the state to discover that only one of his school friends remained living there. So what had begun as a story on the lasting effects of segregated education shifted its focus to the Great Migration, as Parks took to the road to reconnect with his fellow students in the northern industrial cities to which they had gone.

Three of Parks' classmates ended up on the South Side of Chicago, which, by 1950, was the *de facto* capital of African American life in the U.S. There he found Margaret Tyson married to Thomas Wilkerson, a postal worker, and their six-year-old daughter Barbara, living in an apartment on Cottage Grove Avenue. Parks described Margaret as "too gentle to be bitter" and with fonder memories of growing up in Fort Scott than her friends, even though she had never been able to finally realize her early dreams of becoming a teacher.

Gordon's photograph shows Margaret seated next to Barbara who is playing an upright piano, which would have been understood as a symbol of success by *Life*'s readers. Happily, the powerful aspirations that the Wilkersons had for their young daughter did come to pass and she went on to earn advanced degrees in her mother's chosen field of education and enjoy a long career as a teacher, principal, administrator, and author. Barbara Wilkerson Bailey is married to her own high school classmate, a career army officer, and with him has traveled the world and raised two sons.

GRACE HIGHTOWER DE NIRO

PATRON OF THE ARTS



Grace Hightower De Niro is first and foremost the proud and devoted mother of two cherished children. She is a supporter of Bring Change 2 Mind, Autism Speaks and JobPath. She is inspired to help create a path for young adults with disabilities to enter the workforce and to be part of their communities by developing tools to utilize their many talents.

Grace has served as a board member of the New York Women's Foundation and the New York Fund for Public Schools. She is a member of Ronald Perelman's Women's Heart Health Advisory Council and the International Women's Coffee Alliance. She is an honorary Battalion Chief of the esteemed Fire Department of the City of New York.

To honor her work, Grace was named Mother of the Year by the American Cancer Society in 2012.

Deeply motivated by the Rwandan people's desire to be a country of trade and not aid, Grace partnered with coffee farmers in Rwanda to create Grace Hightower & Coffees of Rwanda, to promote direct sourcing, fair trade and ethical, environmentally-sound agricultural and production practices.

Grace is a philanthropist, actress, singer and an entrepreneur. She is married to actor Robert De Niro.

ROBERT DE NIRO

PATRON OF THE ARTS



Robert De Niro launched his motion picture career in Brian De Palma's "The Wedding Party" in 1969. By 1974 he had won the New York Film Critics Award for Best Supporting Actor in "Bang the Drum Slowly" and from the National Society of Film Critic for "Mean Streets."

In 1974 De Niro won the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actor for "The Godfather, Part II." In 1980 he won his second Oscar, as Best Actor, for "Raging Bull." He has earned Academy Award nominations for his work in five additional films: "Taxi Driver," "The Deer Hunter," "Awakenings," the remake of "Cape Fear," and "Silver Linings Playbook."

In 2009, De Niro received the Kennedy Center Honor for his distinguished acting. He also received the Stanley Kubrick Award from the BAFTA Britannia Awards. De Niro was honored with the Cecil B. DeMille Award at the 2011 Golden Globe Awards. He served as the jury president of the 64th Cannes Film Festival.

De Niro takes pride in his production company, Tribeca Productions, the Tribeca Film Center, (which he founded with Jane Rosenthal in 1988,) and in the Tribeca Film Festival, which he founded with Rosenthal and Craig Hatkoff. The festival was conceived to foster the economic and cultural revitalization of Lower Manhattan through an annual celebration of film, music, and culture.

Through Tribeca Productions, De Niro develops projects on which he has served as producer, director and actor. Tribeca's "A Bronx Tale" in 1993 marked De Niro's directorial debut. He later directed and co-starred in "The Good Shepherd."

USHER RAYMOND IV

HONOREE



This year is proving to be a big year for Usher not only in music but also film and TV. Musically, Usher is currently finishing recording his much anticipated 8th studio album which is set for release this Fall. Earlier this year he completed the filming of his role as boxer Sugar Ray Leonard in the upcoming film "Hands of Stone," a biopic of boxer Roberto Duran played by Edgar Ramirez and costarring Robert De Niro. In addition, Usher recently completed his second season as a coach on NBC's Emmy award winning hit TV show "The Voice" where he proved his top-notch coaching capability by mentoring Josh Kaufman who became the champion of season 6.

Challenging himself creatively and testing musical boundaries are characteristics that have defined Usher's career since he was first discovered twenty years ago on Star Search. Usher has been ranked by the Recording Industry Association of America as one of the best-selling artists in American music history, having sold over 46 million albums worldwide. He has won numerous awards including 8 Grammy Awards and was named the #1 Hot 100 artist of the 2000s decade. *Billboard* named him the second most successful artist of the 2000s decade, with his career-propelling 2004 album "Confessions" being ranked as the top solo album of the 2000s decade. Usher has attained nine Hot 100 #1 hits (all as a lead artist) and 18 Hot 100 top-10 singles.

Realizing that with success comes responsibility, Usher has also proven to be a major philanthropic force. Founded in 1999, his New Look Foundation empowers youth from impoverished communities to become leaders. In recognition of his accomplishments, Usher has been honored by the Boys & Girls Clubs of America, the Trumpet Foundation, Do Something, the NAACP, and as the 2010 Ford Freedom Award Scholar. Usher's business ventures include a best-selling line of fragrances, and a business venture with RBMG (Raymond Braun Media Group).

THORNTON DIAL

HONOREE



Thornton Dial was born in the tiny farm community of Emelle in western Alabama to an unwed teenaged mother. He dropped out of school in the third grade. In his early teens, after his mother married, he and his half-brother, Arthur, were sent to live with their grandmother and great-aunt in Bessemer. He had a wide variety of jobs, eventually working until retirement at the Pullman Standard Company. Although Thornton Dial began making "things" at an early age and continued to create art throughout adulthood, he originally kept his work hidden, or destroyed it out of apprehension about the subversiveness of its content. His work came to the attention of the outside world in 1987. His varied body of work, usually done in series of up to fifteen pieces, includes paintings, assemblage, sculptures, and works on paper. Thornton Dial deals with major events of widespread interest—the death of Princess Diana, the OJ Simpson trial and 9/11—and incidents bothersome to the artist himself—a hurricane, tornado or snowstorm; a 60 Minutes segment; and the 1996 Olympics.

His personal, abstract, and conceptual style, like the work of many other outstanding artists of his genre, has thoroughly contradicted the conventional misconceptions about the work of "self-taught" or "outsider" artists. Among the many museums that include Thornton Dial in their collections are the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Museum of Fine Arts in Houston.

"Art is like a bright star up ahead in the darkness of the world. It can lead peoples through the darkness and help them from being afraid of the darkness. Art is a guide for every person who is looking for something. That's how I can describe myself: Mr. Dial is a man looking for something. My art is the evidence of my freedom. All my pictures somehow be mostly about freedom. The black race of people have freedom now. That's true. And we have the opportunity to look back at what we have did and be proud. Martin Luther King helped us get to that, with what he told us about the freedom of life. He said these things will happen, that we will join hands together. The world is getting more civilized now, more than I have ever seen in my life. A black man can be recognized now. That's true. I know that I don't have to ask nobody for a license to make art. My art talk about freedom. People have fought for freedom all over the world. I try to show that struggle. It's a war to be fought. We're trying to win it."

Thornton Dial

LAURENT CLAQUIN

HONOREE



Laurent Claquin is the Head of Kering Americas, the parent company of 22 leading global luxury and sport & lifestyle brands including Gucci, Yves Saint Laurent, Alexander McQueen, Balenciaga, Brioni, Stella McCartney, Puma and Volcom. Claquin has been with Kering, formerly known as PPR, since 2004 when he joined as an advisor to Francois-Henri Pinault at Artemis.

Before rising to Head of Kering Americas, Claquin initiated and developed the Corporate Social Responsibility program at Kering. Prior to that, Claquin was Kering's Senior Vice President of Communication. Claquin began his career in 1994 as a consultant at Coopers & Lybrand.

In 1997, Claquin pursued his passion for the arts by working at the Galerie Nationale du Jeu de Paume in Paris. Additionally, Claquin was the Deputy Communications Director at the Pompidou Center. Since 2002, Claquin served as Deputy Chief of Staff to the French Minister of Culture and Communication and then Technical Advisor to the Minister since 2004.

Claquin is a graduate of the ESC Rennes School of Business and currently resides in New York City.

JR Honoree



JR exhibits freely in the streets of the world, catching the attention of people who are not typical museum visitors. In 2006, he created Portrait of a Generation, portraits of suburban "thugs" that he posted, in huge formats, in the bourgeois districts of Paris. This illegal project became "official" when the Paris City Hall wrapped its building with JR's photos. In 2007, with Marco, he made Face 2 Face, the biggest illegal exhibition ever. JR posted huge portraits of Israelis and Palestinians face to face in eight Palestinian and Israeli cities. In 2008, he embarked on a long international trip for Women Are Heroes, in which he underlines the dignity of women who are often the targets of conflicts, and created The Wrinkles of the City.

In 2010, his film "Women Are Heroes" was presented at Cannes. In 2011 he received the TED Prize, after which he created Inside Out, an international participatory art project that allows people worldwide to get their picture taken and paste it to support an idea and share their experience – as of May 2015, over 250,000 people from more than 120 countries have participated, through mail or gigantic photobooths. His most recent projects involve a photobooth truck on Times Square where 6,000 New Yorkers participated; a collaboration with New York City Ballet; a huge installation on the Pantheon in Paris; the pasting of a container ship and an exhibition on the abandoned hospital of Ellis Island. As he remains anonymous and doesn't explain his huge full-frame portraits of people making faces, JR leaves the space empty for an encounter between the subject/protagonist and the passer-by/interpreter. That is what JR's work is about, raising questions...

PHARRELL WILLIAMS MUSICAL PERFORMANCE



Redefining cool for a new generation, Pharrell Williams is a creative force, using music, fashion and design to express his distinctive style. From his beginnings as a teenage prodigy and multi-instrumentalist in the early '90s, through enough hits to earn him *Billboard's* Producer of the Decade in 2010, to his current status as multi-media superstar, Williams has never stopped creating. The music industry has honored Pharrell with 10 Grammy Awards and ASCAP's prestigious Golden Note Award in 2012. He also received an Academy Award Nomination for his original song "Happy," featured in the animated film *Despicable Me 2*.

Pharrell's second solo album "G I R L" was released in March 2014 to rave reviews. His prolific body of work ranges from designing a sculpture with Takashi Murakami to accessories and jewelry for Louis Vuitton, to t-shirts for Uniqlo, to adidas sportswear and a forthcoming collaboration with Commes des Garcons. In 2008 he founded From One Hand to AnOTHER (FOHTA), a foundation focused on supporting the Pharrell Williams Resource Centers' learning programs for underserved youth in at risk communities across the nation. His latest venture, i am OTHER, is a multi-media creative collective that serves as an umbrella for all his endeavors. This fall, Pharrell will continue to spread his vision and happiness as he heads out on a 20-date "Dear G I R L" tour across Europe.

ROBERT WAGONER is a junior photography major at Purchase College/SUNY. Seeking the beauty in nostalgic moments is what Robert's work expresses. Implementing memories and creating new scenes to photograph, each image establishes its own sense of the American vernacular. Utilizing his home town of Buffalo, New York in combination with life around the New York City area where he now lives, his work sets a dialogue between these two American atmospheres.

CRAIG WHITE is a junior photography major at Purchase College/SUNY. Raised between Long Island and Harlem, New York, the urban landscape has shaped his viewpoint of the world. Through constantly changing environments, the city of New York and its outskirts provide a framework of concepts suitable for documentation and artistic interpretation. Within his work, public space serves as both a carefully manicured reflection of society and as an archetype filled with drama and emotion. In an effort to appeal to the senses through photography, many of the





moments documented are carefully chosen to make a clear distinction between concept and the everyday moment.

A current Fellow in The Cinema School's Honors Film Program, Andrew aspires to become a writer/director of feature length films and to make films that are innovative and revolutionary. VICTORIA TORRES was raised in the Bronx, New York where she now attends The Cinema School. At a young age, Victoria showed interest in writing, keeping a journal of some of her stories. She is an alumnus of The Cinema School's Honors Film Program and last August, she was the 1st Assistant Director for the Honors Program's 2015 Thesis Film Project, "Documented," a short film produced in Stockholm, Sweden. Her senior film project "Symmetry" will debut this month. She is excited about the next step in her career: heading off to college where she hopes to flourish as a writer.

KHADY GUEYE, 2015 YoungArts Winner in Voice, is a 17 year old mezzo-soprano who was born and raised in the Bronx, New York. She is currently a student at Fiorello H. LaGuardia High School of Music & Art and Performing Arts and is heavily involved in the schools chorus program. She has performed, among other songs and arias, Mozart's Requiem, Francis Poulenc's Stabat Mater, along with two a cappella pieces: Eric Whitacre's Alleluia, and Pavel Chesnokov's Salvation is Created. To date, singing with her chorus has been her most memorable experience. She thrives off of the relief and rapturous satisfaction of executing magnificent pieces of music and recognizing the choirs' work to get to the performance stage.



MAURICE JOHNSON, 2015 YoungArts Winner in Voice, is a 17 year old Gospel vocalist originally from Hempstead, New York. He has been singing since he was three years old and performing since the age of eight . Johnson has won first place at several national competitions, including the Apollo 2011, Health First, IMMG Music Group Nassau County Singing Contest 2010, I'm A Star To Talent Show Case 2009 and McDonald's 2013 Gospelfest. He has also received awards from the New York State Senate and the New York City Council. Johnson primarily performs at churches, weddings and other events and has also toured Europe. He has been



approached by major record labels but has declined their offers and is waiting for an opportunity that will align with the intended message he is trying to convey to his audience through his music.

YOUNGARTS is the core program of the National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts (NFAA), founded in 1981 by businessman and visionary, the late Ted Arison, who also founded Carnival Cruise Lines, and his wife Lin. The organization's mission is to identify the next generation of emerging artists in the performing, visual, and literary arts, to provide educational enrichment and assistance in their pursuit of the arts, and to foster a greater appreciation for the arts. Each year, more than 5,000 young artists apply to the YoungArts program, and the winners are selected by esteemed national panels of judges in the various arts disciplines. YoungArts winners experience life-changing workshops and master classes with such renowned Legacy Masters as Mikhail Baryshnikov, Martin Scorsese and Quincy Jones, as well as major performance opportunities and access to significant scholarships during YoungArts Weeks held in Miami, New York, Washington DC, and elsewhere. Additionally, YoungArts serves as the exclusive nominating agency for the U.S. Presidential Scholars in the Arts, one of the country's highest honors for young artists. The YoungArts program has honored more than 16,000 young artists with more than \$6 million in monetary awards and has facilitated in excess of \$100 million in college scholarship opportunities. Alumni go on to become leading professionals in their fields and include Emmy-nominated actress Vanessa Williams, four-time Tony Award nominee Raúl Esparza, star of HBO's Entourage Adrian Grenier, recording artists Nicki Minaj, Executive Director of the American Ballet Theatre Rachel Moore, Academy Award nominated actresses Viola Davis and Kerry Washington, and internationally acclaimed multimedia artist Doug Aitken.

GORDON PARKS CENTENNIAL SCHOLARSHIP RUSH PHILANTHROPIC ARTS FOUNDATION

KYRA NOVICK is an 18 year-old high school senior who has been involved with art projects and animals in Brooklyn for as long as she can remember. In third grade she was told she had ADHD and a learning disability but those have never gotten in her way as an artist. Although academic work is sometimes arduous, art has always been a welcome challenge.

When Kyra started as a Rush Kid years ago, she discovered a whole new way of exploring "art." She worked with unique people who

shared their techniques and who actually made their living as artists. She began to see the art in everything around us, not just on museum walls.

VERA TINEO is 17 years old and grew up in Brooklyn, New York. She enjoys doing all types of art but recently has found herself doing abstract art as well as digital art about social injustice. She is interested in art that is about human interactions. Rush Arts has been an opportunity to see a new world that Vera otherwise would have never had access to. Growing up, she did not have much exposure to art until she joined Rush during her junior year of high school.

The program showed her that, with practice and time, she can make a great piece of art work in her own style. She was not confined to a type or form of art, but aided in finding a new way of expressing herself with different mediums.

RUSH EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Offered in 15 sessions twice a year on Saturday mornings, after school, and over the summer, Rush Kids/ Teens serves 100+ students every year, youths who are eager to explore new forms of creativity and selfexpression, to expand their understanding of the contemporary art and culture that surrounds them, and develop new ideas and ways of thinking about their world. The program is taught in the Rush Galleries, where the students experience exhibitions of professional artists' work. It also incorporates extensive field trips to working artist's studios and other contemporary art exhibitions in venues throughout the city. Students learn about the concepts, themes and the formal components and media of the art, discuss how the artists relate their work to larger social and cultural issues, and, in intensive, handson workshops, and create their own artwork based on these learning experiences. Rush programs are taught by a rotating roster of teaching artists: 27 working professional artists and experienced teachers of diverse backgrounds. Each teaches workshops based in their own studio practice, exposing the students to a wide range of cultural viewpoints, media, themes and teaching styles.

Founded in 1995 by brothers Russell, Danny and Joseph "Rev. Run" Simmons, Rush Philanthropic Arts Foundation is a 501c3 organization dedicated to providing public school students with invaluable arts education experiences, and empowering emerging artists through exhibition opportunities. Rush operates two galleries (Corridor Gallery in Clinton Hill, Brooklyn and Rush Arts Gallery in Chelsea), and directly serves over 2,400 students through its education programs (Rush Gallery in the School, Rush Education Exchange, and Rush Kids/Teens).

GORDON PARKS FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP HARLEM SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

This Scholarship recognizes new talent that has come out of the Harlem School of the Arts where their mission is to provide outstanding instruction in five unique disciplines in the arts – music, dance, theatre, visual arts and musical theatre for K-12 populations.

EMILIO SALCEDO is a senior at Uncommon Charter High School in Brooklyn, New York and an HSA Prep Visual Arts student. He has been taking lessons in visual arts disciplines such as drawing and painting since elementary school. Emilio has interned at ArtsConnection, an arts education non-profit in Manhattan. Through the HSA Prep program, Emilio has collaborated on the Hidden History of the Harlem Renaissance with artist-inresidence, Paco Cao. He has also experimented with graphic design and sculpture for the first time. Emilio hopes to enroll in college as an art major next fall.



JANESSA RIVERA is a 13-year-old middle school student and a first year HSA Prep Visual Arts student from West Harlem. She has challenged herself with advanced courses such as graphic design, art history, sculpture, photography, and The City and the Artist in her time at HSA. Through HSA, she has participated in two arts exhibitions, one at Columbia University and another at the National Black Theatre.



HARLEM SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

In 1965, the founder of The Harlem School of the Arts, internationally acclaimed concert soprano Dorothy Maynor, brought a gift to Harlem – her fervent belief in world-class training in the arts. She came to Harlem at a time when the community suffered severe physical blight, high levels of poverty and few cultural resources for its young people.

Today—nearly 50 years after its founding—the mission of The Harlem School of the Arts remains to enrich the lives of young people and their families through world-class training in, and exposure to, the arts. The School accomplishes this through on-site instruction in music, dance, theatre, visual arts and musical theatre; partnerships with New York City schools; community performances and family programming; and by providing workspace for aspiring artists.

HSA carries out its mission by providing outstanding instruction in five unique disciplines in the arts –music, dance, theatre, visual arts, and musical theatre – for K-12 populations. Compared to community schools of the arts in New York, HSA's tuition is among the lowest in the city. Yet, a large number of the School's core constituents cannot afford the tuition.

Parks' novel *The Learning Tree* was published in late August 1963. To promote the book's release, *Life* published two poignantly titled essays written and illustrated by Parks. "How It Feels to Be Black" paired excerpts from *The Learning Tree* with photographs Parks made, inspired by his novel; *Boy with June Bug* was published in the essay with the caption "A recaptured Boyhood of joy, of longing and sudden violence." That promotional essay was followed by another, "The Long Search for Pride," where Parks recounted bigotry from his childhood and discussed how his lingering sentiments related to the ongoing struggle for civil rights.

In the wake of the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott, *Life* asked Parks to travel to Alabama and document African-American life under Jim Crow segregation in the rural South. In 1956, Parks spent several weeks traveling through the state and focused much of his attention on the everyday lives of one extended black family. He hoped his photographs of the Thornton family at home, work, play, and church would illustrate the similarities between black and white families' lives and values and thus challenge the notion that races are innately unequal. Parks' photographs were published in the photo essay "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," part four in a series on the background of segregation, in the September 24, 1956, issue of *Life*. This photograph taken at a funeral in Shady Grove was not published.

Parks first photographed Olympic gold medalist and world heavyweight champion boxer Muhammad Ali in 1966 when he was in the midst of an intense national controversy after changing his name from Cassius Clay, converting to Islam, and befriending Malcolm X and Elijah Muhammad and joining the Black Muslim cause. A year later Ali was stripped of his heavyweight title and boxing license for refusing induction into the U.S. military, citing religious reasons, which further fueled the public's negative feelings toward him. In 1970, Parks profiled his now friend Muhammad Ali again for *Life*. Four years after the previous photo essay, Ali was still cloaked in controversy. In the article "Look Out—He's Back: A Different Muhammad Ali Returns to the Ring," Parks sought to show the concentration and ferocity the more mature Ali brought to his training, but he also continued his effort to change the public perception of the boxer, who was training for a fight with Joe Frazier to regain his heavyweight title. This photograph showcasing Ali's playful side was published in the *Life* article.

This troubling picture was taken outside of Pritchard, Alabama in 1956 while Parks was on assignment documenting segregation. Parks' shot notes explicitly take note of the children's races as well as clarify that they were playing with toy guns. The photograph was never published in the *Life* photo essay.

On August 28, 1963, approximately 200,000 advocates for civil rights amassed at the Lincoln Memorial for the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. This event came at a critical moment not just in the struggle for civil rights, but also for Parks personally. Three months earlier, *Life* had published a collection of photographs and a personal essay Parks made after traveling across the country documenting Malcolm X and Black Muslims. (And just a week before the March, the magazine published his two pieces about *The Learning Tree* and his own experiences with racism.) These projects that culminated in 1963 perhaps served as Parks' personal rallying cry before the March, which concluded as the largest demonstration for human rights in U.S. history. Although many photographers were present, the best-known photographs of this event exist in black-and-white. Parks shot many frames in color, but none was published in *Life*.

In early 1961, *Life* assigned Parks the task of capturing the ethereal qualities of new chiffon dresses by California designer James Galanos. Parks playfully used light and movement to showcase the billowy, elegant fabric. A slight variant of this image was published in the photo essay "Breezy Elegance in Bright Chiffon," published in the April 14, 1961, issue of *Life*. The caption boasted that this "deceptively simple" evening gown was so "intricately and artfully constructed" that one would not know that it was made from yards of chiffon.

Henry and Virgie Lee Tanner and their four children were members of the family Parks documented as part of his 1956 series on segregation in the South. He photographed the Tanner children's experience with segregation on the outskirts of Mobile, Alabama. Although many images are of where the children could not go, such as a white-only playground, *Store Front* shows the combination grocery store and beauty parlor that was a community center of sorts for them and neighborhood children. This photograph was published in "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," part four in a series on the background of segregation, in the September 24, 1956, issue of *Life*.

"I was doing graffiti when I was 14, 15, and I found this really cheap camera in the subway, and I documented writers in the street, our life, going on the rooftops or tunnels, with that cheap camera. I used film because I knew that in my high school I could use the lab. Then the cheapest way to do it was to develop the negative and then make a small print and then photocopy it—literally Xerox it. And that would make a really cheap print, but it worked for me. I've always been used to that quality. It was never something precious to me; it was something that I could paste right away."
