Our Special Guest KATHLEEN CLEAVER

Former Black Panther Leader

Kathleen Neal Cleaver has traveled internationally since childhood. In 1967 she joined the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, and has continued to engage in human rights work to free wrongfully imprisoned activists and to advance social justice. She became an early leader in the original Black Panther Party (1967), and in 1970 collaborated with her late husband Eldridge Cleaver to establish the Black Panther's International Section in Algeria.

Kathleen Cleaver graduated summa cum laude from Yale College in 1982, and earned a J.D. at Yale Law School in 1989. She is a member of the faculty at Emory Law School in Atlanta, Georgia. Her writings have been published in numerous books, magazines, and newspapers, including *Liberation, Imagination and the Black Panther Party* (2001) which she co-edited with George Katsiaficas, and as the editor of *Eldridge Cleaver's Target Zero: A Life in Writing* (2006). Kathleen Cleaver has appeared in numerous documentary films, most recently *Black Panthers: Vanguard of the Revolution*, directed by Stanley Nelson (2015).

BRYAN STEVENSON

FOUNDER, EQUAL JUSTICE INITIATIVE



Bryan Stevenson is the founder and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative in Montgomery, Alabama. Mr. Stevenson is a widely acclaimed public interest lawyer who has dedicated his career to helping the poor, the incarcerated and the condemned. Under his leadership, EII has won major legal challenges eliminating excessive and unfair sentencing, exonerating innocent death row prisoners, confronting abuse of the incarcerated and the mentally ill and aiding children prosecuted as adults. Mr. Stevenson has successfully argued several cases in the United States Supreme Court and recently won an historic ruling in the US Supreme Court banning mandatory life-withoutparole sentences for all children 17 or younger as unconstitutional. EJI has also initiated major new anti-poverty and anti-discrimination efforts challenging the legacy of racial inequality in America. Mr. Stevenson's work has won him numerous awards including the ABA Wisdom Award for Public Service, the MacArthur Foundation Fellowship Award Prize, the Olaf Palme International Award, the Gruber Prize for International Justice and the Ford Foundation Visionaries Award. In 2015, he was named to the *Time* 100 recognizing the world's most influential people. Recently, he was named in Fortune's 2016 World's Greatest Leaders list. He is a graduate of the Harvard Law School and the Harvard School of Government, has been awarded 22 honorary doctorate degrees and is also a Professor of Law at the New York University School of Law. He is the recent author of the critically acclaimed New York Times bestseller, Just Mercy, which was named by Time Magazine as one of the 10 best books of nonfiction for 2014 and has been awarded several honors including the Carnegie Medal by the American Library Association for the best nonfiction book of 2014 and a 2015 NAACP Image Award.

Founded in 2008, PUBLIC SCHOOL is redefining the landscape for menswear and women's wear. Chow and Osborne blend high and low references from fashion, music and art to create a point of view that is both unique and precisely edited.

Chow and Osborne design and manufacture the full range of their collections in New York, incorporating fabric from the best Italian, Japanese and American mills. It is paramount to the Public School brand DNA that it keeps its production roots in New York, supporting local tailors, pattern makers and skilled garment workers. It is these genuine and personal experiences throughout the development process along with their design mantra "finding perfection in imperfection," that epitomize the brand and its commitment to produce only the finest clothing.

PUBLIC SCHOOL has received many honors, including the 2013 CFDA Swarovski Award for Menswear; the 2013 CFDA VOGUE Fashion Fund Award; the 2014 CFDA Menswear Designer of the Year Award; and the first International Woolmark Prize for Menswear in January 2015.

The PUBLIC SCHOOL collection is available at major department stores and specialty boutiques including Bergdorf Goodman, Barneys, Saks Fifth Avenue, Harrods and many others.

LEONARD A. LAUDER AND JUDY GLICKMAN LAUDER

PATRONS OF THE ARTS

JUDY GLICKMAN LAUDER is an internationally recognized photographer and philanthropist. She is a Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society of Great Britain. Her photographs have been exhibited worldwide and are represented in two traveling exhibitions, *Holocaust; The Presence of the Past* and *Resistance and Rescue; Denmark's Response to the Holocaust.* Her work is represented in over 300 public and private collections, including the J. Paul Getty Museum, the Whitney Museum of American Art,



the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the United States Holocaust Museum. She is represented by the Howard Greenberg Gallery in New York City.

Numerous books of her work have been published. Most recently, Upon Reflection: Photographs by Judy Ellis Glickman; Both Sides of the Camera: Photographs from the Collection of Judy Ellis Glickman; and For the Love of It: the Photography of Irving Bennett Ellis.

Presently, Mrs. Lauder serves on the Board of Trustees of the Portland Museum of Art and is a member of both the Getty Museum Photographic Council and the Photographic Visiting Committee of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

LEONARD A. LAUDER is Chairman Emeritus of The Estée Lauder Companies Inc. and the senior member of its Board of Directors.

Mr. Lauder graduated from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School and is emeritus trustee at the university. He is chairman emeritus of the Whitney Museum of American Art; co-founder and co-chairman of the Alzheimer's Drug Discovery Foundation; honorary chairman of the board of directors of the Breast Cancer Research Foundation; a member of the Council on Foreign Relations; a member of the President's Council of Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center; and chairman emeritus and a lifetime trustee of the board of directors of the Aspen Institute. He served on the Advisory Committee for Trade Negotiations to President Reagan (1983–1987). In addition, he was named an Officier de la Légion d'Honneur by France; recognized by the United States Navy Supply Corps Foundation with its Distinguished Alumni Award; received the 2013 Palazzo Strozzi Renaissance Man of the Year Award; and named a Living Landmark by the New York Landmarks Conservancy in 2014.

LATOYA RUBY FRAZIER

PHOTOGRAPHER



Visual artist LaToya Ruby Frazier works in photography, video and performance to build visual archives that address industrialism, rustbelt revitalization, environmental justice, healthcare inequity, family and communal history. In 2015 her first book *The Notion of Family* (Aperture 2014) received the International Center for Photography Infinity Award and Frazier received the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation Fellowship.

Born in 1982 in Braddock, Pennsylvania Frazier received her BFA in applied media arts from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania (2004) and her MFA in art photography from Syracuse University (2007). She also studied under the Whitney Museum of American Art Independent Study Program (2010-2011) and was the Guna S. Mundheim Fellow for visual arts at the American Academy in Berlin (2013-2014).

In 2014, Frazier accepted the assistant professor of photography position at School of the Art Institute of Chicago. She has previously held academic and curatorial positions at Yale University School of Art, Rutgers University and Syracuse University.

JANELLE MONÁE

MUSICIAN



A GRAMMY Award-nominated singer-songwriter, performer, producer and CoverGirl spokesperson, Janelle Monáe is known for her unique style and groundbreaking sound. In 2010, Monáe released the highly-anticipated and critically-acclaimed album *The ArchAndroid*, which earned her two GRAMMY Award nominations.

In 2013, her celebrated album reached No. 5 on the Billboard Top 200 Chart. The video for the album's first single, "Q.U.E.E.N.," received a coveted MTV VMA Moonman. In 2013, Monáe received Billboard's prestigious 2013 Rising Star Award.

Most recently, Monáe was presented with the Jane Ortner Education Award from Michelle Obama and the Grammy Museum. She was also acknowledged by the Harvard College Women's Center and the Harvard College Black Men's Forum. In February 2015, Monáe announced her independent label, WONDALAND RECORDS, through a joint venture partnership with Epic Records.

Jonathan "Jon" Batiste is a singer, multi-instrumentalist, educator, and bandleader from Kenner, Louisiana. In this way she begins to see her surroundings in a whole new way.

ZURI JORDAN is a sophomore studying to receive her BFA in photography. Being born and raised in Washington D.C. has played a vital role in Zuri's understanding of the world and her development as a photographer. In her own words, "Tourists, street art, architecture, and the many peculiar people I encounter on a daily basis have contributed to my ever-growing admiration and curiosity about how photography impacts our society. We live in a world where cameras have become so commonplace that people can construct a persona with one click." Zuri's aim is to capture humans in "one click" in their natural transparent state.

KIARA DUNKLEY is an artist currently attending Kingsborough Early College Secondary School, which is affiliated with Kingsborough Community College, and allows students to not only receive a high school diploma, but also an associate's degree. Kiara began attending Rush six years ago and has learned, through art, to better express her feelings. Rush has allowed Kiara to tell her story and has helped her to grow into the well-rounded person she is now. Each Rush class ends with a group critique in which everyone is expected to speak about their art and the work of others. This practice has given her confidence to speak



in a crowd and to enjoy listening, questioning and holding an active dialogue with many different types of people. The Rush program is a positive haven encouraging children to do well in order to better their futures.

AJANI RUSSELL is an artist driven by the simple wonders of creativity, interactions with her environment, and emotions that she experiences strongly or which rise from impactful events. Topics Ajani has tackled include common insecurities and flaws, injustice in many contexts, and the impact society and our educational system have on children. Ajani has attended Rush Education Programs since she was eight years old. Rush has groomed her artistic skills and broadened her intellectual horizons by enabling her to experience and explore different art forms. It taught her to nurture her artistic ability and exposed her to new methods creation by challenging her creativity.

JALEEL WILSON is 18-years-old and was born and raised in Brooklyn, New York. He is currently a senior at Repertory Company High School For Theatre Arts with an interest in acting, singing, and dancing and a passion for visual art. Jaleel loves art because it makes him feel like he can do anything because there are no limits. When he gets to college he hopes to study studio art as well as art history. Being a part of the Rush family means the world to Jaleel. Rush is the reason he wants to pursue art in college. RUSH EDUCATION PROGRAMS Offered in 15 sessions twice a year on Saturday mornings, after school, and over the summer, Rush Kids/Teens serves 100+ students every year, youths who are eager to explore new forms of creativity and self-expression, to expand their understanding of the contemporary art and culture that surrounds them, and develop new ideas and ways of thinking about their world. The program is taught in the Rush Galleries, where the students experience exhibitions of professional artists' work. It also incorporates extensive field trips to working artist's studios and other contemporary art exhibitions in venues throughout the city. Students learn about the concepts, themes and the formal components and media of the art, discuss how the artists relate their work to larger social and cultural issues, and, in intensive, hands-on workshops, and create their own artwork based on these learning experiences. Rush programs are taught by a rotating roster of teaching artists: 27 working professional artists and experienced teachers of diverse backgrounds. Each teaches workshops based in their own studio practice, exposing the students to a wide range of cultural viewpoints, media, themes and teaching styles.

In the early 1960s, as the civil rights movement accelerated, *Life* sought to gain access to the increasingly contentious Black Muslim movement. When several white reporters were turned away by the group's leaders, Gordon Parks – the only black member of the magazine's staff – was asked to try. To his surprise, Malcolm X already knew who Parks was and invited him to a special meeting with the spiritual leader of the Nation of Islam, Elijah Muhammad, who agreed to the article. Parks gained unprecedented access to Malcolm X, Muhammad, and the Nation of Islam and photographed their activities ranging from prayer meetings, self-defense drills and rallies. On June 29, 1963 Malcolm X stood at the corner of East 115th Street and Lenox Avenue in Harlem and spoke to crowds assembled in the streets, sidewalks, windows, and even rooftops. He condemned President Kennedy for focusing on the growing problems in Berlin, Germany "when 20,000,000 black men have no freedom here." Photographs made at the Harlem rally were published in an essay Parks wrote for *Life* titled "The Long Search for Pride" in the August 16, 1963 issue.

\$15,000 - \$20,000

Parks first photographed Olympic gold medalist and world heavyweight champion boxer Muhammad Ali in 1966 when he was in the midst of an intense national controversy after changing his name from Cassius Clay, converting to Islam, and befriending Malcolm X and Elijah Muhammad and joining the Black Muslim cause. It was just two years earlier that twenty-two-year-old Cassius Clay became heavyweight champion of the world by defeating Sonny Liston. Parks aimed to not just document Ali as he trained to defend his title from Henry Cooper; he set out to determine whether Ali was "really as obnoxious as people were making him out to be." What resulted was comprehensive body of work about the complicated young star finding his place in the world; the photographs and an essay Parks authored were titled "The Redemption of the Champion" and published in the September 9, 1966 issue of *Life*. A year later Ali was stripped of his heavyweight title and boxing license for refusing induction into the U.S. military, citing religious reasons, which further fueled the public's negative feelings toward him.

Allie Lee Causey was a member of the Thornton family Parks documented for the 1956 *Life* story about Jim Crow segregation in rural Alabama. Causey, a grade school teacher in a dilapidated four-room schoolhouse, was perhaps the most outspoken of the Thornton family about the lives African Americans lived in the segregated South. She lived with her husband, Willie Causey, and their combined family of 11 children in Shady Grove, a predominately African American town 100 miles northeast of Mobile. This photograph shows some of the Causey children on the porch of their home with the family's handsome 1955 Chevrolet sedan in the background. Mr. Causey said the car was a symbol, a means of asserting "equality." Sadly, when the *Life* article "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," part four in a series on the background of segregation, was published in the September 24, 1956 issue there was severe backlash against the Causeys for their now published views of segregation.

In 1961, *Life* magazine assigned Parks the task of capturing the ethereal qualities of new chiffon dresses by California designer James Galanos. Parks playfully used light and movement to showcase the billowy, elegant fabric. A slight variant of this image was published in the photo essay "Breezy Elegance in Bright Chiffon," published in the April 14, 1961, issue of *Life*. The caption described the 15-layer chiffon hat paired with the floating sash were added touches that "make the outfit seem about to fly away."

On August 28, 1963, approximately 200,000 advocates for civil rights amassed at the Lincoln Memorial for the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. This event came at a critical moment not just in the struggle for civil rights, but also for Parks personally. Three months earlier, *Life* had published a collection of photographs and a personal essay Parks made after traveling across the country documenting Malcolm X and Black Muslims. (And just a week before the March, the magazine published his two pieces about *The Learning Tree* and his own experiences with racism.) These projects that culminated in 1963 perhaps served as Parks' personal rallying cry before the March, which concluded as the largest demonstration for human rights in U.S. history. Although many photographers were present, the best-known photographs of this event exist in black-and-white. Parks shot many frames in color, but none were published in *Life*.

Invisible Man by Ralph Ellison represents a watershed in the canon of American fiction. Winner of the National Book Award in 1953, the novel has been hailed as one of the first to treat the black experience in twentieth-century America as a full human experience. Soon after its publication, Parks set out to evoke passages from the novel by shooting a series of images on the streets of Harlem inspired by the story for *Life* magazine. The resulting images testify not only to the book's deep impression on him, but also illustrate Parks' expanding vision as well as his technical expertise around this time. He re-created passages from the book by staging an actor around Harlem, where both Ellison and Parks had lived for some time. This image, titled *The Invisible Man*, opens the article "A Man Becomes Invisible" published in the August 25, 1952 issue of *Life*. Parks' and Ellison's collaboration is the subject of a major exhibition titled *Invisible Man*: Gordon Parks and Ralph Ellison in Harlem that just opened at the Art Institute of Chicago as well as a publication of the same name.

In the wake of the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott, Life asked Parks to travel to Alabama and document African-American life under Jim Crow segregation in the rural South. In 1956, Parks spent several weeks traveling through the state and focused much of his attention on the everyday lives of one extended black family. He hoped his photographs of the Thornton family at home, work, play, and church would illustrate the similarities between black and white families' lives and values and thus challenge the notion that races are innately unequal. Parks' photographs were published in the photo essay "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," part four in a series on the background of segregation, in the September 24, 1956, issue of Life. This photograph of segregated drinking fountains taken outside of a Dairy Queen in Mobile was published in that article.

By the late 1960s, the militant edge of the civil rights movement was the Black Panther Party, led by Huey P. Newton, Bobby Seale, and Eldridge Cleaver, the Panther's Minister of Information who had become the party's spokesman. In 1970 *Life* asked Gordon Parks to report on the Party and, like assignments before this one, he immersed himself in the lives of his subjects; it would be Parks' final major work for the magazine. He sat in on operations meetings at the San Francisco Bay headquarters, road with the Panthers on patrols, and flew to Algeria to locate Cleaver, who was there in exile. Cleaver was there with his wife, Kathleen, the Panthers' Communications Secretary, and their infant son to avoid a return to prison after his parole was revoked following a confrontation between the Panthers and police. Though on the run and in a weakened state, Cleaver lived up to the nickname his wife had given him: "Papa Rage." Instead of an interview, Parks received a scathing lecture in which Cleaver launched into a diatribe against "Babylon," his term for the United States. Photographs from this assignment were published in "The Panthers: Cutting Edge of Black Revolt" in the February 6, 1970 issue of *Life*. This portrait, which was published alongside Parks' text about the Cleavers, is a sympathetic view of the couple who Parks portrayed as intelligent, well-spoken, and devoted.



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in the Old Masters Painting Division. In 1965 he moved to New York as the head of Sotheby's Old Masters Painting Division. He was ordained as an Episcopal priest in 1976, but remained at Sotheby's. He has written three books – Sotheby's Guide to Buying and Selling at Auction in 1983, Journeying with Julian in 1993, and The Complete Guide to Buying and Selling at Auction in 1997. He is an accomplished auctioneer, lecturer and contributor to journals on all aspects of the auction business.

Gordon Parks believed that the power of transforming lives was through self-expression – through art. He used his camera, his words, and his music to tell stories to give a voice to the voiceless. Widely known as the most important African-American photographer of the twentieth century, Parks exposed the face of American poverty with sympathy and dignity, using his artistic skill to champion social change. Today, the Gordon Parks Foundation, provides scholarships to students whose creative work reflects the mission and vision of Gordon Parks, and continues to preserve Parks' vast archive, publish books, and work with museums and schools throughout the world.
