

## **GORDON PARKS**

beat Karl feld Logerfeld Tonight, we celebrate Gordon Parks and his ongoing legacy as a humanitarian and artist. "All of my work is influenced by my imagination," Parks once said. This was true of his photography, reporting, filmmaking, prose and music. At the heart of the Foundation's mission are Gordon's own words. He described his work as "our common search for a better life and a better world." His camera was his weapon of choice to fight racism and poverty. He knew that art could be a powerful weapon, as potent as any other, and that through pictures and words, he could open our eyes.



Our 2019 Gordon Parks Foundation Award recipients are six extraordinary individuals: Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Chelsea Clinton, Raf Simons, Kehinde Wiley and Carol Sutton Lewis and William M. Lewis, Jr. Their work has changed the social landscapes of civil and human rights, sports, fashion, art and philanthropy. Each has helped to elevate a field that Gordon Parks himself worked within and cared deeply about. Each exemplifies Parks' commitment to inspire future generations. Tonight we also celebrate the 20th anniversary of Gordon Parks' *A Great Day in Hip Hop* photograph, one of the most legendary photos in hip-hop history.

We are pleased to announce the creation of The Gordon Parks Arts and Social Justice Fund to support year-round grant-making and educational initiatives, which include scholarships, prizes and fellowships. Just as the Julius Rosenwald Fund gave Parks his life changing fellowship in 1942, our goal is to continue to support students and artists to develop their talents and use them to further social change.

Earlier this year, our longtime event co-chair and past honoree Karl Lagerfeld died. Karl was committed to supporting the Foundation, and we will miss him greatly. His "beat goes on" as you can see by his sketch on the opposite page. 

## SARAH JONES HOST

Sarah Jones (Actress/Writer/Producer): Called "a master of the genre" by *The New York Times*, Sarah Jones is a Tony® and Obie Award-winning performer and writer known for the multi-character, one-person Broadway hit *Bridge & Tunnel*, originally produced by Oscar® winner Meryl Streep, and her current, critically-acclaimed show *Sell/Buy/Date*.



Renowned as "a one-woman global village", she has also given multiple main-stage TED Talks garnering nearly six million views, performed at The White House and United State of Women Summit for President and First Lady Obama, and given a historic performance at The World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland.

The daughter of two physicians, Sarah was educated at The United Nations School and Bryn Mawr College, all of which contributed to her becoming a vocal advocate for the empowerment of women and girls globally. In her role as a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador, she has performed for audiences around the world, and raised awareness of issues including ethnic, racial, and economic disparities in the United States.

Most recently, Jones launched Foment Productions, a social justice-focused entertainment company. *Sell/Buy/Date*, which has been commissioned by the NoVo Foundation, was its first production. Foment Productions is also developing a docuseries with Ron Howard's Imagine Entertainment.



## KAREEM ABDUL-JABBAR



Kareem Abdul-Jabbar is a journalist, novelist, and screenwriter, as well as a former professional basketball player. Since retiring from the NBA in 1989, he has been a political activist and education advocate. His non-fiction books include biography, social commentary, and history books promoting African-American history and achievements. He has written 15 books and is a New York Times best-selling author. His latest books include Coach Wooden and Me: Our 50-Year Friendship On and Off the Court, and Becoming Kareem: Growing Up On and Off the Court. He also has a fictional series, Mycroft & Sherlock, which releases its third book in September 2019. Mr. Abdul-Jabbar also produced an award-winning documentary adaptation of On the Shoulders of Giants, which won an NAACP Image Award. He was featured in HBO's most watched documentary of all time, Kareem: Minority of One. In 2016, President Barack Obama awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the country's highest honor for civilians. He has twice won Columnist of the Year Award from the National Arts and Journalism Awards for his writing in The Hollywood Reporter.

## **CAROL SUTTON LEWIS and WILLIAM M. LEWIS, JR.**

**CAROL SUTTON LEWIS** is an attorney whose current focus is on education and the arts. She is the Vice Chair of the Studio Museum in Harlem, and co-chairs its Capital Campaign Committee. She is on the board of the Foundation for Art and Preservation in Embassies, and is a former trustee of the Addison Gallery at Phillip's Academy in Andover, Mass.

Carol has spent over 20 years focusing on child development, parenting, and education, and is especially interested in how children of color learn and develop. She shares best practices in her parenting blog called Ground Control Parenting (groundcontrolparenting. com) which is designed for parents of children of color and has a particular emphasis on issues affecting boys.

She is a member of the Board of Trustees of Stanford Law School and The University of Pennsylvania's School of Arts and Sciences, and is a former trustee of the Collegiate School in New York City. She was appointed by President Obama to serve on the Advisory Council of the My Brother's Keeper Alliance, and sits on the New



York Advisory Council of Common Sense Media, an advocacy group dedicated to helping children thrive in a world of media and technology.

**WILLIAM M. LEWIS, JR.** is a Managing Director and Co-Chairman of Investment Banking at Lazard Ltd. In addition, Mr. Lewis chairs the Firm's Global Investment Banking Managing Director Promotion Committee.

Mr. Lewis was elected a Managing Director of Morgan Stanley in 1989, becoming the firm's first African-American Managing Director. Between 1994 and 2004, Mr. Lewis was head or co-head of the Global Banking Department, the Global Mergers & Acquisitions Department and Morgan Stanley Realty. His last position at Morgan Stanley was Co-Head of the Global Banking Department where he was responsible for the firm's global industry practices and regions which accounted for revenue in excess of \$2 billion. In addition to his transaction, business development and management responsibilities at Morgan Stanley, Mr. Lewis was also chairman of the firm's charitable foundation, chairman of its diversity task force, member of the firm's Political Action Committee, and member or chairman of numerous other internal committees including recruiting, mentoring, promotion, evaluation and compensation.

Mr. Lewis is a member of the Economic Club of New York and currently serves on the boards of a number of not-for-profit organizations including Uncommon Schools (the largest charter school organization in the Northeast), the New York City Police Foundation, The Posse Foundation, Research Alliance for NYC Schools and the Institute for Sports Medicine Research. He is also a member of the Harvard Management Company which is responsible for the Harvard University endowment. In the past, he has served as Co-Chairman of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, Treasurer of the National Urban League, Chairman of A Better Chance and as a member of the boards of Phillips Academy, the American Museum of Natural History, the Executive Committee of the USGA, Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, the New York Philharmonic, Morehouse College, the Central Park Conservancy, the NCAA Advisory Board, Harvard's Committee on Alumni Affairs and Development, Harvard's Task Force on Students and Northwestern Memorial Hospital (Chicago). In addition to his not-for-profit activities, Mr. Lewis serves on the board of Ariel Investment Trust and formerly served on the boards of Freddie Mac and Darden Restaurants.

## **CHELSEA CLINTON**



As Vice Chair of the Clinton Foundation, Chelsea Clinton works to drive its vision and programmatic objectives with the goal of creating greater opportunities for people to build better futures for themselves, their families, and their communities. Chelsea is a tireless advocate for expanding access to early childhood education, improving the health and well-being of Americans across the country, providing the next generation of young leaders with the resources they need to turn their ideas into action, and ensuring the empowerment of girls and women is a cross-cutting priority across all of the Foundation's programs and initiatives. Chelsea also serves on the board of the Clinton Foundation's affiliated Clinton Health Access Initiative and Alliance for a Healthier Generation.

In addition, Chelsea is co-author with Devi Sridhar of Governing Global Health: Who Runs the World and Why?, and author of It's Your World: Get Informed, Get Inspired & Get Going, Start Now! You Can Make a Difference, She Persisted: 13 American Women Who Changed the World and the companion She Persisted Around the World.

Chelsea holds a Bachelor of Arts from Stanford, a Master of Public Health from Columbia's Mailman School of Public Health, and both a Master of Philosophy and a Doctorate in International Relations from Oxford University.

She lives with her husband Marc, their daughter Charlotte, and their son Aidan in New York City.

## **RAF SIMONS**



The most important message Raf Simons wants to communicate is:

#### PRIDE IN INDIVIDUALITY.

Fueled by his love for both rebellious youth cultures and traditional menswear, he emerges in fashion halfway through the nineties, presenting a radically different image of masculinity. Fusing the energy and singularity of teenage subcultures with the sharpness and precision of classicial sartorial craft, the look presented by Raf Simons is both inspired by and designed for confident outsiders.

From the first collection on, music, art, performance, images and words have a substantial role in the whole package, summing up, or rather clarifying the kind of world Raf Simons wants to project. Always at the core of his universe (and as essential as the clothes themselves) are attitudes, moods and statements about individuality and independence.

Equally important in Raf Simons' approach is the constant quest for innovation. The designs are always looking for the now and tomorrow, even if they are inspired by historical or classical references. Throughout the years, with the signature style evolving and maturing, the key elements stay the same: modern proportions, a constant research for fabrics and textures and above all the interplay of pure construction and new shapes with the body and psyche of the contemporary man.

## **KEHINDE WILEY**



Kehinde Wiley has firmly situated himself within art history's tradition of portraiture. As a contemporary descendent of a long line of portraitists, including Reynolds, Gainsborough, Titian, and Ingres, among others, Wiley engages the signs and visual rhetoric of the heroic, powerful, majestic and the sublime in his representation of urban, black and brown men and women found throughout the world. By applying the visual vocabulary and conventions of glorification, history, wealth and prestige to the subject matter drawn from the urban fabric, the subjects and stylistic references for his paintings and sculptures are juxtaposed inversions of each other, forcing ambiguity and provocative perplexity to pervade his imagery.

Kehinde Wiley holds a BFA from San Francisco Art Institute; an MFA from Yale University; and honorary PhDs from Rhode Island School of Design and San Francisco Art Institute. His paintings are in the collections of over forty museums including the National Portrait Gallery, Washington, D.C.; the Los Angeles County Museum of Art; the Hammer Museum, Los Angeles; the Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles; the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; and the Brooklyn Museum. Selected museum exhibitions include the National Portrait Gallery, Washington, D.C.; Phoenix Art Museum; Jewish Museum, New York; the Brooklyn Museum; the Petit Palais, Paris; BOZAR, Brussels; the Phoenix Museum of Art; the Toledo Museum of Art; and the Modern, Fort Worth, among others. His work has been the subject of ten monographs to date. Wiley was the subject of the documentary, *An Economy of Grace* (2014, Show of Force).

Wiley was honored in 2015 by the U.S. Department of State with the Medal of Arts award, celebrating his commitment to cultural diplomacy through the visual arts. In February 2018, his portrait of Barack Obama was added to the permanent installation of presidential portraits in the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery. He received the W.E.B. Du Bois Medal in October 2018 from Harvard University's Hutchins Center for African & African American Research. Wiley lives and works in New York, Dakar, and Beijing.

## **LOOKING BACK**



Gordon Parks, A Great Day in Harlem, Harlem, New York, 1995.

In 1958, Art Kane (1925–1995) photographed 57 jazz musicians spilling off a brownstone stoop in Harlem for an *Esquire* magazine issue about the evolution of the genre. Since the Harlem Renaissance, the neighborhood had been a notable center of the uniquely American sound of jazz. His photograph—commonly referred to as "A Great Day in Harlem"—ingrained itself in our collective memory, epitomizing the "golden age" of jazz and Harlem. In 1995, *Life* magazine positioned 10 of the 12 surviving participants of Art Kane's photograph "Golden Age of Jazz" (1958) where they stood nearly 40 years earlier at 17 East 126th Street. Gordon Parks took Kane's place and made a new photograph. In the moving image, the boarded up and roofless shell of the brownstone emphasized the absent musicians who had died.

Four decades after Kane, Gordon Parks visited the same brownstone at 17 East 126th Street for *XXL* magazine to photograph hip-hop artists, producers, and influencers. *A Great Day in Hip-Hop* shows 177 of a new genre's "golden age" overflowing the stoop of number 17 to the two stoops on either side and reclaiming the space for the next generation. Tonight, we celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the historic "Great Day in Hip-Hop."

## **MUSICAL PERFORMANCE**

The legendary Roots Crew have become one of the best known and most respected hip-hop acts in the business, winning four GRAMMYS, including "Best R&B Album" for *Wake Up!*, "Best Traditional R&B Vocal



Performance" for "Hang in There" (with John Legend) and "Best Group or Duo R&B Vocal Performance" for "Shine." This brings the band's GRAMMY nomination count to twelve. Additionally, "The Roots Picnic," a yearly star-studded mix of musicians, has become a celebrated institution. The Roots were named one of the greatest live bands around by *Rolling Stone* and serve as the official house band on *The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon*. Most recently, The Roots announced that they are developing an animated children's series, along with a live action children's series, in partnership with Amazon.



In 1942, Gordon Parks received the Julius Rosenwald Fellowship to support his career as a photographer. 

## 2019 GORDON PARKS FOUNDATION FELLOW GUADALUPE ROSALES

**GUADALUPE ROSALES** is an artist based in Los Angeles.

Guadalupe Rosales has been building an archive of vernacular photographs and ephemera connected to Latino/a culture in Southern California. Her projects exist as both archives of physical objects and crowd sourced digital archives, assembled on her widely followed Instagram accounts: Veteranas & Rucas (@veteranas\_and\_rucas) and Map Pointz (@ map\_pointz). Guided by an instinct to create counter narratives, Rosales tells the stories of communities often underrepresented in official archives and public memory.



Her work has been exhibited at Aperture Foundation,

NYC; The Vincent Price Art Museum, Monterey Park, California; Commonwealth and Council, Los Angeles; Bemis Center for Contemporary Arts, Omaha; Spazio Maiocchi, Milan, Italy; and the Museum of Contemporary Art, North Miami. In 2016, Rosales took over *The New Yorker*'s social media account and was one of the top-rated takeovers of the year. Her subsequent role as the inaugural Instagram Artist in Residence at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art was featured in the *Los Angeles Times*, *Artsy*, and *Artforum*. She has lectured at numerous museums and academic institutions, including the University of California, Los Angeles; Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles; J. Paul Getty Museum, Los Angeles; New Museum, New York; New York University; and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. Rosales received an MFA from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2016.

HANK WILLIS THOMAS is a conceptual artist working primarily with themes related to perspective, identity, commodity, media, and popular culture. His work has been exhibited throughout the United States and abroad including the International Center of Photography, New York; Guggenheim Museum Bilbao, Spain; Musée du quai Branly, Paris; Hong Kong Arts Centre, Hong Kong, and the Witte de With Center for Contemporary Art, Netherlands, Thomas' work is included in numerous public collections including the Museum of Modern Art, New York; Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York; Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Brooklyn Museum, New York; High Museum of Art, Atlanta, and the National Gallery of Art, Washington D.C. His collaborative projects include Question Bridge: Black Males, In Search Of The Truth (The Truth Booth), and For Freedoms, which was awarded the 2017 ICP Infinity Award for New Media and Online Platform. In 2012, Question Bridge: Black Males debuted at the Sundance Film Festival and was selected for the New Media Grant from the Tribeca Film Institute. Thomas is also the recipient of the Guggenheim Fellowship (2018), AIMIA | AGO Photography Prize (2017), Soros Equality Fellowship (2017), and is a member of the New York City Public Design Commission. Thomas holds a B.F.A. from New York University (1998) and an M.A./M.F.A. from the California College of the Arts (2004). He received honorary doctorates from the Maryland Institute of Art and the Institute for Doctoral Studies in the Visual Arts in 2017. Thomas is represented by Jack Shainman Gallery, New York; Ben Brown Fine Arts, London; Goodman Gallery, South Africa; and Marauni Mercier, Belgium.

#### HARVARD UNIVERSITY

**SEBASTIAN JACKSON** is a PhD Candidate in African and African American Studies and Social Anthropology at Harvard University. His research interests have to do with race, intimacy, and kinship in postcolonial societies. His interdisciplinary dissertation research in Cape Town, South Africa seeks to tell the story of apartheid's "Immorality Laws" and their aftermath. These laws criminalized all sexual and intimate relationships between people of European descent on the one hand, and those of African and South East Asian descent on the other. These anti-miscegenation laws were finally repealed in 1985, but the draconian repression of desire and intimacy left deep psychic scars in post-apartheid society. Sebatian is of Dutch and African American parentage, and was raised on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean. Sebastian completed master's degrees in African Studies from the University of Oxford and in Social Anthropology from the University of Cambridge.



JULIANA LAMY is currently a junior at Harvard University. She was born in Haiti, but moved to South Florida when she was three years old. She is currently studying History & Literature with a particular focus on the Caribbean, Australia, and the intersections of indigeneity, blackness, and colonialism. 





While on assignment documenting segregation in the south in 1956, Gordon Parks covertly made a few photographs in the waiting area of Atlanta Municipal Airport Temporary Terminal. In the notes that accompanied the film sent to *Life* magazine's lab, Parks wrote: "These shots were all taken candidly in the Airlines Terminal in Atlanta." This image, he said, "shows the continuous matter of servitude which extends into the terminal around 2 a.m. Here, a white baby is held by a Negro maid while the baby's mother checks on reservations, etc. Although the Negro woman serves as nurse-maid for the white woman's baby, the two would not be allowed to sit and eat a meal together in any Atlanta restaurant." This compelling photograph was not published in the final *Life* September 24, 1956 photoessay "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," which focused on the life of the Thornton family in Alabama. However, a detail of this photograph was the cover of *Segregation Story*, the catalogue for the exhibition of the same name on display at High Museum of Art in 2015. From then on, it received international attention as the subject of *The New York Times'* LENS post "Help Unravel a Gordon Parks Southern Mystery," where columnist James Estrin asked his readers to assist in identifying the women pictured. The subjects were never named.



By the mid-1940s, Gordon Parks had cemented his reputation as a successful photographer, and Ralph Ellison was an established author working on his first novel, *Invisible Man* (1952). Less well known, however, is that their vision of racial injustices, coupled with a shared belief in the communicative power of photography, inspired collaboration on two important projects, in 1948 and 1952. Capitalizing on the growing popularity of the picture press, Parks and Ellison first joined forces on an essay titled "Harlem Is Nowhere" for '48: The Magazine of the Year. This illustrated essay was to be centered on the Lafargue Clinic, the first nonsegregated psychiatric clinic in New York City, as a case study for the social and economic conditions in Harlem. He chose Parks to create the accompanying photographs, and during the winter months of 1948, the two roamed the streets of Harlem together, with Parks photographing under the guidance of Ellison's writing.

The 2016 book and exhibition (The Art Institute of Chicago) *Invisible Man: Gordon Parks and Ralph Ellison in Harlem* focused on these two projects, neither of which was published as originally intended, and provides an in-depth look at their shared vision of black life in America, with Harlem as its nerve center. The authors' research has provided strong evidence that *Off on My Own* was originally part of this unpublished series and was paired with Ellison's caption "Who am I? Where am I? How did I come to be? Behind the endless walls of his ghetto man searches for a social identify. Refugees from southern feudalism, many Negroes wander dazed in the mazes of northern ghettos, the displaced persons of American democracy."

Over the course of his career, Parks' greatest achievements were in documentary photojournalism, but he also cultivated a reputation for his fashion photography. In fact, his willingness to work on fashion shoots repeatedly opened doors to other possibilities. Notable among his many fashion assignments were the pieces he did as the first African American staff photographer for *Life* between 1948 and 1951, which included the highly sought-after assignment to photograph fashion shows in Paris. This photograph of the "short shingle" haircut displayed a "reminder of the flapper days" that the article "Does the American woman need a new figure?" in the October 24, 1949 issue of *Life* claimed were making a comeback. The picture was published again in *Life* a year later ("This Lady Is Dyeing Her Hair," November 27, 1950), declaring the short cut was now out of style in favor of the classic chignon.



In 1957, *Life* assigned Parks to illustrate the first article of a six-part series that investigated crime in the United States. The resulting 10 page photo-essay titled "The Atmosphere of Crime" was the first essay of its kind in color to be published in mainstream American media. The editors wanted to examine not only rising rates of criminal misconduct but also the perceived lack of response to such activity. Parks embarked on a six-week journey that took him and a reporter, Henry Suydam, to the streets of New York, Chicago, San Francisco, and Los Angeles. Many of Parks' images are low-lit, with figures shown in shadow, reflected in mirrors or windows, and blurred in motion. Later Parks vividly described episodes from this assignment, most notably traveling with two ethically questionable Chicago policemen as they went on drug raids, and the chilling execution of convicted murderer Thomas Johnston at San Quentin. After a preview of the series in the September 2 issue of Life, the first full-length article was published on September 9. This unpublished dark image of a police officer surveying crowds outside Broadway theatres on West 44th Street typifies the gloomy, grainy style of the entire series.

While working in France in 1951, Gordon Parks was assigned by *Life* to photograph the Swiss artist Alberto Giacometti at his Paris studio. By this time Giacometti was sought after by avant-garde collectors throughout Europe and the United States. He developed the style that made him famous, paring down the human form to elongated figures with gaunt faces and attenuated limbs. "I felt I needed to realize the whole," he said, "a structure, a sharpness . . . a kind of skeleton in space . . . [the] essence of man." Parks captured Giacometti and his sculptures in his studio, but also brought his works outdoors and photographed them among Parisians in streetscapes. This series demonstrates how Parks experimented with depth of field and a variety of vantage points to show the sculptures as towering figures in their surroundings. This photograph of the artist and his sculpture *Falling Man* was not published in the *Life* story.


Gordon Parks photographed four young, rising painters—Helen Frankenthaler, Grace Hartigan, Nell Blaine and Jane Wilson—for the *Life* magazine article "Women Artists in Ascendance" published in the May 15, 1957 issue. (Joan Mitchell was also included but not photographed by Parks.) Helen Frankenthaler, whose career spanned six decades, has long been recognized as one of the great American artists of the twentieth century. Heir of first-generation Abstract Expressionism, she brought together in her work—with prodigious inventiveness and singular beauty—a conception of the canvas as both a formalized field and an arena for gestural drawing. She was eminent among the second generation of postwar American abstract painters and is widely credited for playing a pivotal role in the transition from Abstract Expressionism to Color Field painting. One of the foremost colorists of our time, she produced a body of work whose impact on contemporary art has been profound. Parks' image shows Frankenthaler seated on one of her canvases spread on the floor of her West End Avenue studio; a variant of this image lead the *Life* article.

In the wake of the 1955 Montgomery Bus Boycott, *Life* asked Gordon Parks to travel to Alabama and document African-American life under Jim Crow segregation in the rural South. In 1956, he spent several weeks traveling through the state and focused much of his attention on the everyday lives of one extended black family. He hoped his photographs of the Thornton family at home, work, play, and church would illustrate the similarities between black and white families' lives and values and thus challenge the notion that races are innately unequal. Parks' photographs were published in the photo essay "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," part four in a series on the background of segregation, in the September 24, 1956, issue of *Life*. The outspoken Allie Lee Causey—daughter of the elder Thorntons—was a gradeschool teacher of 120 elementary students in a dilapidated four-room school house. Her husband, Willie Causey, owned 40 acres of land and made his living as a farmer and woodcutter. Here we see them on the porch with four of the children in their combined family. This image was not published in the final *Life* article. The magazine later reported that Mrs. Causey's activism and involvement with the photo-essay caused her to lose her job and her husband to lose his truck (rendering him unable to work); after losing their livelihood and fearing for their safety, the family moved out of Alabama.

Gordon Parks first photographed Olympic gold medalist and world heavyweight champion boxer Muhammad Ali in 1966 when he was in the midst of an intense national controversy after changing his name from Cassius Clay, converting to Islam, and befriending Malcolm X and Elijah Muhammad and joining the Black Muslim cause. (It was just two years earlier that the twenty-two-year-old Clay became heavyweight champion of the world by defeating Sonny Liston.) Parks aimed to not just document Ali as he trained to defend his titled from Henry Cooper; he set out to determine whether Ali was "really as obnoxious as people were making him out to be." What resulted was a comprehensive body of work about the complicated young star finding his place in the world; the photographs and an essay Parks authored were titled "The Redemption of the Champion" and published in the September 9, 1966 issue of *Life*. This portrait of Ali formally-dressed was made at Lord's Cricket Ground in the St. John's Wood neighborhood of London where Ali meet with the West Indies team as they competed against England.

Gordon Parks made this now iconic photograph showing Joanne Thornton and her niece Shirley Diane Kirksey outside the segregated entrance of Saenger Theatre in downtown Mobile, Alabama while on assignment for *Life* documenting segregation in the south. Joanne was not included in the final photo essay and, as a result, did not suffer the backlash from the publication as her extended family did. She went on to marry Troy Wilson, have two children, receive a college degree, and teach American government and economics to disadvantaged high schoolers for 36 years. At the 2013 Gordon Parks Foundation Awards Dinner and Auction Mrs. Wilson was honored with a copy of *Department Store* and recalled, "I wasn't going in. I didn't want to take my niece through the back entrance. She smelled popcorn and wanted some. All I could think was where I could go to get her popcorn."



In 1958, Art Kane (1925–1995) photographed 57 jazz musicians spilling off a brownstone stoop in Harlem for an *Esquire* magazine issue about the evolution of the genre. Since the Harlem Renaissance, the neighborhood had been a notable center of the uniquely American sound of jazz. His photograph—commonly referred to as "A Great Day in Harlem"—ingrained itself in our collective memory, epitomizing the "golden age" of jazz and Harlem. Four decades after Kane, Gordon Parks visited the same brownstone at 17 East 126th Street for *XXL* magazine to photograph hip-hop artists, producers, and influencers. *A Great Day in Hip-Hop* shows 177 of a new genre's "golden age" overflowing the stoop of number 17 to the two stoops on either side and reclaiming the space for the next generation. Tonight, we celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the historic "Great Day in Hip-Hop."

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
Honor and Dignity explores the four decade-long career of documentary photographer Jamel Shabazz in nearly 60 lesser-known images carefully selected by the artist. Born and raised in Brooklyn, Shabazz began photographing at the age of 15 to document his peers. As his practice continues 40 years later, Shabazz bears witness to the evolution of his community with a goal to "contribute to the preservation of world history and culture." Like Gordon Parks, he prioritizes portraying his subjects with honor and dignity. In 2018, Shabazz received the Gordon Parks Foundation Award for his commitment to the arts in ways that reflect Parks' ideas and goals by using creative means to inspire the next generation.

#### Dearest Gordon,

Twenty years ago, on September 29, I put my Rolleiflex camera in my bag and took the train up to 126th Street to meet you on the block where you would capture history. We spent the day together for what would become one of my greatest life moments.

You sat in that metal fold-up chair most of the day smoking that dope pipe of yours while you took in your surroundings, which included the legendary three brownstones where the nearly 200 rap artists would pose later that afternoon. At one point I crossed the street, took out my camera and started snapping shots of you.

Later in the afternoon, it was a powerful and cerebral moment watching the sun trying to shut down the shoot as you waited to press the shutter-release button.

RESPECT., the photo journal of Hip-Hop culture, which I launched a decade ago, recently published a tribute to the 20th anniversary

of the shoot entitled "The Game Changer." Written by former XXL editor in chief Sheena Lester, it documents her recollection of that day (and how my wife suggested that XXL recreate Art Kane's iconic photo). At press time I remembered my negatives, had them scanned and they were exactly what I recalled capturing.

Great Day, Great Man was donated to The Gordon Parks Foundation in celebration of the twentieth anniversary of your legendary photoshoot. It was included in the recent exhibition A Great Day that was installed at The Gordon Parks Foundation's 48 Wheeler exhibition space from February 1 through March 29, 2019.

Thank you, Gordon, for one of the greatest days of my life. You are dearly missed.
