This year included an exhibition at the New Orleans Museum of Art on Gordon's legendary Red Jackson story. It will travel this fall to the University of Virginia's Fralin Art Museum. Gordon's work was exhibited in Milan, Arles, Rome and Moscow as part of a travelling exhibition organized with our partners Fondazione Forma per la Fotographia. It was also recently featured at CONTACT, a Toronto photography festival. This fall "The Segregation Story" will open at the High Museum of Art in Atlanta along with a companion book published by Steidl. In early 2015 an exhibition at the Museum of Fine Arts Boston, "Back to Fort Scott" will highlight Gordon's early Kansas years.

DR. ROSCOE BROWN



Dr. Roscoe C. Brown, Jr., Director of the Center for Urban Education Policy and University Professor at the Graduate School and University Center of The City University of New York (CUNY), is President Emeritus of Bronx Community College of CUNY, and was founding Director of the Institute of Afro-American Affairs at New York University. He holds a doctorate from New York University, and served on faculty at West Virginia State College and as a full professor at New York University's School of Education. A native of Washington, D.C., Dr. Brown is a graduate of Paul Laurence Dunbar High School, and received his Bachelor's degree from Springfield College in Massachusetts.

Dr. Brown is Past President of One Hundred Black Men, and has served on the boards of many regional and City educational, arts and cultural and civic organizations -- including the YMCA of Greater New York, Fund for the City of New York, New York City Partnership, Association to Benefit New York, Museum of the City of New York, City Parks Foundation and Libraries for the Future.

Dr. Brown has received numerous awards and honors for scholarly and community activities, among them the NAACP Freedom Award, the Congressional Award for Service to the African-American Community, the New York Urban League's Distinguished Citizen Award and Distinguished Alumnus awards from his alma maters – New York University and Springfield College. He was honored as a "New York City Treasure" during the City's Centennial celebration, received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor and the New York Post's Liberty Medal.

An Army Air Force Captain in World War II, Dr. Brown commanded the 100th Fighter Squadron of the 332nd Fighter Group (the famed "Tuskegee Airmen") and is credited with being the first 15th Air Force fighter pilot to shoot down a German jet fighter. In March 2007, Dr. Brown and his fellow Tuskegee Airmen were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal in recognition of their ...








Gordon Parks in Tuskegee Airmen Fighter Jacket, Selfridge Field, Michigan © Cecil Layne, 1943

"America was in the second year of World War II. Unrest was building in the black military quarters because of discriminatory practices against Negroes in the Air Force. The 332nd Fighter Group was the first Negro fighter group. I was assigned to cover them training in Michigan, then travel with them to record them in combat overseas. During my weeks with these brave men, we lost a pilot in bad weather. His body had to be taken 300 miles to be embalmed because there were no facilities for handling the Negro dead. In December, training was finished; we were going overseas. As the traveling orders came in I learned my clearance had been canceled. I was taken aside and told that there were some politicians who realized that my pictures would appear in the white media. They did not want this small group of Negro pilots to get any publicity. The mood was bad when I was ordered to leave the base. A black crewman had been beaten up by white para-troopers. Those brave fighter pilots sailed toward war and death as they fought Hitler's Luftwaffe. But racism towards me and them meant that I would not record these brave Negro heroes in action."


The Gordon Parks Patron of the Arts Award recognizes and celebrates individuals with a deep appreciation of the arts. Recipients receive this special recognition for their support and promotion of artistic activity in the visual arts, film, literature or performing arts.

The Gordon Parks Award is given to individuals who have enriched our lives in ways that reflect Parks' ideas and goals by using creative means to inspire the next generation.

MELLODY HOBSON Patron of the Arts

Mellody Hobson is president of Ariel Investments. Headquartered in Chicago, the firm offers six noload mutual funds for individual investors and defined contribution plans as well as separately managed accounts for institutions and high net worth individuals. As president, Mellody is responsible for firm-wide management and strategic planning, overseeing all operations outside of research and portfolio management. Additionally, she serves as chairman of the board of trustees for Ariel Investment Trust.

Beyond her work at Ariel, Mellody has become a nationally recognized voice on financial literacy and




Mellody is chairman of the board for DreamWorks Animation SKG, Inc. as well as a director of The Estée Lauder Companies Inc., Groupon, Inc. and Starbucks Corporation. Her community outreach includes serving as chairman of After School Matters, a non-profit that provides Chicago teens with high quality, out-of-school time programs. Furthermore, she is a board member of the Lucas Cultural Arts Museum, The Chicago Public Education Fund, Sundance Institute and is on the executive committee of the Investment Company Institute's board of governors. Mellody earned her AB degree from Princeton's Woodrow Wilson School of International Relations and Public Policy. She also received honorary doctorate degrees in humanities from both Howard University and St. Mary's College.



GEORGE LUCAS Patron of the Arts

George Lucas' devotion to timeless storytelling and cuttingedge innovation has resulted in some of the most successful and beloved films of all time. The creator of *Star Wars* and *Indiana Jones*, Lucas has given birth to characters who have entertained and inspired generations of filmgoers and become bedrocks of worldwide popular culture.

Lucas has directed or produced such memorable films as *THX 1138*, *American Graffiti*, *Willow*, and *Tucker: A Man And His Dream*. His company, Lucasfilm Ltd., garnered over 100 Academy Award nominations and more than 40 Oscars and special achievement awards prior to being acquired by the Walt Disney Company in 2012.



Lucas' movies set new standards for visual and aural sophistication. He revolutionized the film industry by forming Industrial Light & Magic to create the visual effects for *Star Wars*, and was the first filmmaker to use computer technology. His research and development led to the first digital editing system (which later became AVID) and the Pixar Computer, which led to Pixar Animation Studios.

In 1999, Star Wars: Episode I The Phantom Menace became the first major live-action film to be projected digitally. Three years later, Episode II was the first major movie shot using entirely digital media. Lucas also executive produced the television series The Young Indiana Jones Chronicles and the popular animated television series, Star Wars: The Clone Wars, both of which were honored with Emmy Awards. In 2012, he released and executive produced the film Red Tails, a fictional story inspired by the historic exploits of the Tuskegee Airmen, America's first all black aerial combat unit. Over the years, Lucas has received some of the entertainment industry's highest honors, including the Irving G. Thalberg Memorial Award from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences; the American Film Institute's Lifetime Achievement Award and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Visual Effects Society.

He has received an honorary doctorate in fine arts from the USC School of Cinematic Arts as well as the NAACP Vanguard Award, given to persons whose groundbreaking work increases understanding and awareness of racial and social issues. Lucas was honored with the nation's highest award for technological achievement, the National Medal of Technology, presented by the President of the United States for 30 years of innovation at Industrial Light & Magic. In 2013, he was awarded the National Medal of Arts, the highest award presented to artists and patrons of the arts by the United States Government, bestowed upon him by the President in recognition of lifetime achievement in the creation and production of the arts in the United States.

Taking a philanthropic leadership role in applying his technical and storytelling expertise to the classroom, Lucas founded the George Lucas Educational Foundation (Edutopia.org) in 1991 to highlight proven strategies, tools and resources for creating lifelong learners. Most recently, Lucas announced plans to build the Lucas Cultural Arts Museum, emphasizing American illustrative, digital, cinematic and animation art as an avenue for the exploration of the great storytelling history, populist works and artistic innovation of the past 150 years.

LORNA SIMPSON

Honoree

Lorna Simpson was born in 1960 in Brooklyn, New York, and received her BFA in Photography from the School of Visual Arts, New York, and her MFA from the University of California, San Diego. When she emerged from the graduate program at San Diego in 1985, she was already considered a pioneer of conceptual photography. Feeling a strong need to re-examine and re-define photographic practice for contemporary relevance, Simpson was producing work that engaged the conceptual vocabulary of the time by creating exquisitely crafted documents that are as clean and spare as the closed, cyclic systems of meaning they produce. Her initial body of work alone helped to incite a significant shift in the view of the photographic art's transience and malleability.



Lorna Simpson first became well-known in the mid 1980's for her large-scale photograph-and-text works that confront and challenge narrow, conventional views of gender, identity, culture, history and memory. With unidentified figures as a visual point of departure, Simpson uses the figure to examine the ways in which gender and culture shape the interactions, relationships and experiences of our lives in contemporary America. In the mid 1990's, she began creating large multi-panel photographs printed on felt that depict the sites of public – yet unseen – sexual encounters. Another aspect of her practice includes figurative drawings of characters, and collages we well as a video work titled "Chess," 2013 which premiered at the Jeu de Paume in May 2013.

Her work has been exhibited at the Museum of Modern Art, New York; the Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago; the Miami Art Museum; the Walker Art Center, Minneapolis; and the Irish Museum of Modern Art, Dublin. She has participated in such important international exhibitions as the Hugo Boss Prize at the Guggenheim Museum, New York, and Documenta XI in Kassel, Germany. She has been the subject of numerous articles, catalogue essays, and a monograph published by Phaidon Press. Her first mid-career survey was exhibited at the Los Angeles Museum of Contemporary Art, the Miami Museum of Art, and the Gibbes Museum in South Carolina with accompanying monograph published by the American Federation of the Arts, New York, and the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York. In 2013 her works on paper was the subject of an exhibition at the Aspen Art Museum with accompanying cataloueg "Lorna Simpson Works of Paper," Aspen Art Museum. A survey retrospective, accompanied by a monograph "Lorna Simpson" published by Prestel Press, New York, premiered in the spring at the Jeu de Paume, Paris, and traveled to the Haus der Kunst, Munich. This April the exhibition was on view at The BALTIC Centre for Contemporary Art, Gateshead, England.

VERA WANG Honoree

Vera Wang has created a unique aspirational world that alludes to sensuality and youthful sophistication. Exquisite details, intricate draping and a nonchalant sense of style characterizes the Vera Wang aesthetic.

Vera Wang, a native New Yorker, understands women who embrace fashion. By age 23, Vera was the youngest ever VOGUE fashion editor and stylist where she remained for 16 years before moving to Ralph Lauren as a design director. In 1990, Vera Wang opened her first flagship store on Manhattan's famed Madison Avenue, introducing fashion to the bridal industry with revolutionary designs and refined detailing. Since then she has expanded her collections to include ready-to-



wear, footwear, eyewear, fragrance, flowers, china and crystal, silver and gifts, bedding, fine papers and her first book, *Vera Wang On Weddings*.

In 2005, the Council of Fashion Designers of America awarded Vera "Womenswear Designer of the Year." Vera further established herself as a style authority in 2007 by sharing her modern sensibility with millions of American women through her *Simply Vera* Vera Wang line available at Kohl's department stores nationwide. In Spring 2011, Vera Wang launched her highly anticipated inaugural collection for David's Bridal, WHITE by Vera Wang which brings the acclaimed Vera Wang aesthetic to a new set of brides. As a natural extension of Vera's passion for designing bridal fashion, Vera Wang partnered with Zale Corporation to introduce Vera Wang LOVE, a collection of diamond engagement rings, wedding bands and solitaire jewelry, available exclusively in Zale stores thoughout the US, Canada and Puerto Rico in Fall 2011. In Spring 2012, Vera Wang introduced an exclusive collection of rental tuxedos for Men's Wearhouse, BLACK by Vera Wang. Vera once again partnered with Kohl's in the Summer of 2012 for her first junior's contemporary lifestyle collection, Princess Vera Wang.

2010 marked Vera Wang's 20th Anniversary as a brand, a celebration of two decades spent at the forefront of fashion. In 2013, Vera Wang was honored with the Geoffrey Beene Lifetime Achievement Award by the Council of Fashion Designers of America.

ED ZWICK Honoree

Born in Winnetka, Illinois, Edward Zwick began directing and acting in high school and trained as an apprentice at the Academy Festival in Lake Forest. While studying literature at Harvard, he continued writing and directing for the theatre. Upon graduation, he was awarded a Rockefeller Fellowship to study in Europe with some of the major innovative theatre companies.

Zwick was accepted as a Directing Fellow at the American Film Institute in 1975. *Timothy And The Angel*, Zwick's AFI short film, won first place in the student film competition at the 1976 Chicago



Film Festival and caught the attention of the producers of the television series, *Family*. He served as story editor on *Family* and subsequently became a director and producer.

For his work on the television movie *Special Bulletin* (as director, producer and cowriter), Zwick received two Emmy Awards. It also marked the beginning of his collaboration with Marshall Herskovitz, with whom he then created the Emmy Award winning television series, *thirtysomething*. Together Herskovitz and Zwick created The Bedford Falls Company as their home for film and television projects, including the critically acclaimed television series *My So-Called Life*, *Relativity* and the Emmy Award and Golden Globe award winning series *Once And Again*.

Zwick began his feature film career directing About Last Night. He went on to direct the Academy Award winning films Glory and Legends Of The Fall. Zwick also directed the films Courage Under Fire, The Siege, The Last Samurai, Blood Diamond, Defiance and Love & Other Drugs. Zwick and Herskovitz also produced the films I Am Sam, as well as Traffic – winner of two Golden Globes and four Academy Awards – directed by Steven Soderbergh. Zwick most recently directed and produced, Pawn Sacrifice starring Tobey Maguire, Liev Schreiber, Michael Stuhlbarg and Peter Sarsgaard.

Zwick has been honored with three Emmy Awards, the Humanitas Prize, the Writer's Guild of America Award, two Peabody Awards, a Director's Guild of America Award and the Franklin J. Schaffner Alumni Award from the American Film Institute. He received an Academy Award as a producer of 1999's Best Picture Shakespeare In Love.

IRVIN MAYFIELD Honoree

Irvin Mayfield, 36, is a Grammy and Billboard Award-winning artist with 15 albums to his credit. Mayfield is the founding Artistic Director of the New Orleans Jazz Orchestra and currently serves as Artistic Director of Jazz at the Minnesota Orchestra. He is a professor at the University of New Orleans, where he also serves as Director of the New Orleans Jazz Institute.

Mayfield was nominated to the National Council on the Arts by President George W. Bush and was subsequently appointed to the post by President Barack Obama in 2010. Mayfield also received



The Chancellor's Award from the University of New Orleans (the highest ranking award given to a professor) in 2010 and was awarded an Honorary Doctorate from Dillard University in 2011.

A passionate advocate for New Orleans and for the arts, Mayfield is Chairman of the Board for the Soledad O'Brien & Brad Raymond Foundation. He also serves as the Chairman Emeritus for the New Orleans Public Library and serves as President of The African American Museum of New Orleans, as well as serving on the boards of Citizens United for Economic Equity, Louisiana State University's Department of Psychiatry and Health Science, the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Foundation, the New Orleans Police and Justice Foundation, Tulane University's School of Architecture, Unity of Greater New Orleans, the University of New Orleans College of Education and Human Development, the Urban Libraries Council and the Youth Rescue Initiative.



JANELLE MONÁE

A GRAMMY Award-nominated singer-songwriter, performer, producer and CoverGirl spokesperson, Janelle Monáe is known for her unique style and groundbreaking sound. In 2010, Monáe released the highly-anticipated and critically-acclaimed album *The ArchAndroid*, which earned her two GRAMMY Award nominations.

In 2013, her celebrated album *The Electric Lady* reached No. 5 on the Billboard Top 200 Chart. The video for the album's first single, "Q.U.E.E.N.," received a coveted MTV VMA Moonman. Monáe also received Billboard's prestigious 2013 Rising Star Award.



DANIEL NAMAN is a sophomore photography major, born and raised in rural, upstate New York. When inquisition always elicited the same intolerant reaction, Daniel's photographic work developed its own questions. Starting with a question, opinion, or concept, his pictures are constructed from the ground up. 



EDEN GIRMA, 2014 YoungArts Winner in Jazz Voice, is a senior at Middleton High School. Despite growing up in a family with no musical experience, she has been supported in all her musical endeavors, beginning piano studies at age 5 and joining her first choir at age 8. Her performances in her hometown Madison, Wisconsin have ranged the classical and jazz genres. In 2012, she was one of 80 students throughout Wisconsin to be accepted into the Wisconsin State Honors Treble Choir, which performed at the Capitol Theater in Madison's Overture Center. RUSH EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Offered in 15 sessions twice a year on Saturday mornings, after school, and over the summer, Rush Kids/Teens serves 100+ students every year, youth who are eager to explore new forms of creativity and self-expression, to expand their understanding of the contemporary art and culture that surrounds them, and develop new ideas and ways of thinking about their world. The program is taught in the Rush Galleries, where the students experience exhibitions of professional artists' work. It also incorporates extensive field trips to working artist's studios and other contemporary art exhibitions in venues throughout the city. Students learn about the concepts, themes and the formal components and media of the art, discuss how the artists relate their work to larger social and cultural issues, and, in intensive, hands-on workshops, and create their own artwork based on these learning experiences. Rush programs are taught by a rotating roster of teaching artists: 27 working professional artists and experienced teachers of diverse backgrounds. Each teaches workshops based in their own studio practice, exposing the students to a wide range of cultural viewpoints, media, themes and teaching styles.

Founded in 1995 by brothers Russell, Danny and Joseph "Rev. Run" Simmons, Rush Philanthropic Arts Foundation is a 501c3 organization dedicated to providing public school students with invaluable arts education experiences, and empowering emerging artists through exhibition opportunities. Rush operates two galleries (Corridor Gallery in Clinton Hill, Brooklyn and Rush Arts Gallery in Chelsea), and directly serves over 2,400 students through its education programs (Rush Gallery in the School, Rush Education Exchange, and Rush Kids/Teens).

THE GORDON PARKS FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP HARLEM SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

This Scholarship recognizes new talent that has come out of the Harlem School of the Arts where their mission is to provide outstanding instruction in five unique disciplines in the arts – music, dance, theatre, visual arts and musical theatre for K-12 populations.

MAYA LEE is fifteen years old and has attended Harlem School of the Arts for almost ten years. She joined the HSA Prep program as a Visual Arts student in 2011 and considers 2014 to be her best year yet. Maya attended HSA galas in both 2013 and 2014, where she worked on a three-hour live abstract painting, and also completed a painting in front of a live audience for an event at HSA for the NFL Players Association and Harlem Fine Arts Show. A student at Fiorello H. LaGuardia High School of Music & Art and Performing Arts, Maya attends HSA courses after school. Among



all her courses, photography is one of her greatest passions. She enjoys taking close-up portraits and also has a talent for developing and printing, which is her favorite process in photography.

Born in 1996 in New York City, MALIKYE WRIGHT is a black visual artist of the new generation. Malikye first found his passion for art at Harlem School of the Arts, where he began courses at age seven and was accepted to the HSA Prep program in 2008. Ever since, his abilities have been tested and stretched to make him the dedicated artist he is today. Through HSA, Malikye had an NFL-themed work showcased at the Harlem Fine Arts Show, participated in the "HoodiesUP" exhibit at the National Black Theatre, and had a mural and photograph chosen for an art show at



the Wright Museum of Art at Beloit College in Wisconsin. He has also participated in several shows at Sky Gallery at Art and Design High School, where he is a student. Malikye finds that through photography he is able to capture the moment and that good results come naturally to him.

HARLEM SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

In 1965, the founder of The Harlem School of the Arts, internationally acclaimed concert soprano Dorothy Maynor, brought a gift to Harlem – her fervent belief in world-class training in the arts. She came to Harlem at a time when the community suffered severe physical blight, high levels of poverty and few cultural resources for its young people.

Today—nearly 50 years after its founding—the mission of The Harlem School of the Arts remains to enrich the lives of young people and their families through world-class training in, and exposure to, the arts. The School accomplishes this through on-site instruction in music, dance, theatre, visual arts and musical theatre; partnerships with New York City schools; community performances and family programming; and by providing workspace for aspiring artists.

HSA carries out its mission by providing outstanding instruction in five unique disciplines in the arts –music, dance, theatre, visual arts, and musical theatre – for K-12 populations. Compared to community schools of the arts in New York, HSA's tuition is among the lowest in the city. Yet, a large number of the School's core constituents cannot afford the tuition.

After the Farm Security Administration (FSA) was dismantled in 1943, the Office of War Information (OWI) hired Gordon Parks as the first African-American war correspondent. Parks was assigned to document the 332nd Fighter training under the command of Colonel Benjamin O. Davis, Jr. at Selfridge Field near Detroit. The Tuskegee Airmen – as they were more commonly known – were the first African-American military aviators in the United States armed forces.




In the wake of the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott, *Life* asked Parks to travel in Alabama and document African-American life under Jim Crow segregation in the rural south in 1956. Parks spent several weeks traveling through the state and focused much of his attention on documenting the Causey family, who, after the photo-essay was published, suffered cruel treatment and were forced out of town. This image was published in the resulting photo essay "The Restraints: Open and Hidden," part four in a series on the Background of Segregation, in the September 24, 1956 issue of *Life* magazine.

While in Chicago for *Life* in 1953, Gordon Parks looked for subjects to photograph for an article to be titled "The Modern Shouting Baptist," which was never published. He photographed these children playing outside of the Metropolitan Missionary Baptist Church.





\$8,500 - \$10,000

Gordon Parks took this photograph for a *Vogue* assignment about modern fashion's revival of Art Nouveau's shapes, colors and symbols as exhibited in fabrics designed by painter Tzaims Luksus. In this photograph, Veruschka models a dress by Pauline Trigère in silk organza designed by Luksus. A variant of this image was published in "Art Nouveau – Flowering again in America" in the March 1, 1965 issue.



\$15,000 - \$17,000


In 1966, Gordon Parks was sent to Miami Beach by *Life* to cover the already enigmatic Muhammad Ali for the first time. (He would later cover him in 1970, too.) It was just two years earlier that twenty-two-year-old Cassius Clay became heavyweight champion of the world by defeating Sonny Liston. Parks aimed to not just document Ali as he trained to defend his title from Henry Cooper; he set out to determine whether Ali was "really as obnoxious as people were making him out to be." What resulted was a comprehensive body of work about the complicated young star finding his place in the world; the photographs and an essay Parks authored were titled "The Redemption of the Champion" and published in the September 9, 1966 issue of *Life*.



\$12,500 - \$15,000

In an attempt to recreate Art Kane's famous photograph "A Great Day in Harlem" made for *Esquire* magazine in 1958, *XXL* magazine and Gordon Parks assembled 177 hip-hop artists and rappers on 126th Street in Harlem on September 29, 1998 for this picture. It was published on the cover of *XXL* in an issue titled "The Greatest Day in Hip-Hop History."
